DEVELOPING A CONSISTENT VIEW OF THE A-E GRADES FOR STUDENT REPORTS

Concerns have been raised by some parents (via the Education Committee of Governing Council) as to the variation in grades students receive from one teacher to the next, or from one subject to another. Parents were seeking more information on how a student's grade is determined.

This year there has been a focus at MVPS to improve consistency across each year level (including grades/reporting), and staff have been working together in year level teams to achieve improvements in this area.

Wendy Lithgow explained that strategies are currently being implemented by DECD to improve consistency in moderation across schools, which will also address consistency within schools. The implementation of the DECD moderation strategy and the work being done by staff year level teams should address some of these issues in the future.

The importance of the comments on reports was emphasised. Parents need to read the comments on reports as well, as this will give a much greater picture of a student's achievement than focusing solely on the grade.

Wendy Lithgow who has a senior leader role across the Partnership (and is based at MVPS) is working with primary school sites on this important work. She has written an explanation of the A-E grading system and the evidence that students need to show in determining the grade.

We hope this clarifies parent concerns and as always, if you have further queries please address these with the class teacher.

What do the A to E Grades mean?

The DECD parent information provides parents with the following information:

A to E grades or word equivalents are used by teachers to report students' achievement against the Australian Curriculum achievement standards. The grades describe a range of achievement from minimal to excellent. The following table describes each grade in words.

	In relation to the achievement standard, your child
Α	is demonstrating excellent achievement of what is expected at this year level.
В	is demonstrating good achievement of what is expected at this year level.
С	is demonstrating satisfactory achievement of what is expected at this year level.
D	is demonstrating partial achievement of what is expected at this year level.
E	is demonstrating minimal achievement of what is expected at this year level.

An 'A' grade indicates that the student has shown a thorough knowledge and understanding of a topic and can apply that information in unfamiliar situations.

Typically, a 'C' grade means a student is achieving what is expected of them at that point in their learning. This is a considerable achievement because of the high expectations built in to the achievement standards.

An 'E' grade means the student is just beginning to work towards the achievement standard.

Being allocated a certain grade is not a simple matter of students doing a series of tests in order to tick off their achievement with a percentage score against a set check list. There are many complex steps for teachers to consider.

At each year level and in each curriculum area, there are three major areas for consideration in assigning the grade that all reference an aspect of curriculum

- 1. knowledge and understanding
 - How well does the student demonstrate the **content** knowledge and understanding of the **big ideas** and **concepts** that surround them?
- 2. development of skills and processes

How well has the student developed **skills** as entities in their own right that then enable the student to engage in the learning area **processes**.

- 3. use of skills and processes
 - How well can the student demonstrate that they can apply choose and use and generalise the use of them in a variety of contexts.

For example, in **English**, Learners develop skills including spelling, grammar and punctuation at the designated level and by developing these skills they are able to engage in the <u>Literacy strand</u> processes of:

- ★ interpreting, analysing, evaluating
- **★** interacting with others
- **★** creating spoken, written and multimodal texts.

The Australian Curriculum: English also incorporates the <u>processes</u> of listening, speaking, reading, viewing and writing in an integrated and interdependent way.

All assessment is drawn from the Australian Curriculum Achievement Standards that articulate the expected learning achievement at a C level. This is what the expected outcome for learning at the year level would demonstrate.

The language that differentiates between the grades is critical:

To achieve an A requires **excellent** achievement of the year level expectations. This involves:

- **★** Thorough knowledge and understanding of the content, key ideas and concepts
- ★ Very high level of competence in the skills and processes
- ★ Uses these skills and processes in new contexts

In defining Thorough, consider - full, exhaustive, absolute, complete, comprehensive, in-depth

New contexts means that the student is able to apply the learning described in the achievement standard to a context beyond that in which it is originally taught. This means that they have multiple ways of knowing and understanding, and are able to demonstrate it.

At A level this transfer of knowledge and skills is demonstrated by the student in the majority of their learning output.

Students can achieve a B when they demonstrate **good** achievement of the year level expectations. This involves:

- **★ Extensive** knowledge and understanding of the content, key ideas and concepts
- ★ **High level** of competence in the skills and processes
- ★ Uses the skills and processes in some new contexts

In defining Extensive, consider - wide, broad, general, big.

At a B level, transfer of learning into new contexts is to be demonstrated on some regular occasions.

When a student gains a C, they are demonstrating their learning at the appropriate standard for their year level. It means that they have reached the attainment that has been planned for and set in the details of the curriculum. This is the level of achievement that is the bench mark for the particular year level and is an honourable achievement.

This involves:

- ★ Satisfactory knowledge and understanding of the content, key ideas and concepts
- **★ Expected** competence in the skills and processes
- **★** Uses the skills and processes in familiar contexts


In defining Satisfactory, consider - acceptable, suitable, reasonable, fitting, agreeable, adequate.

At a C level, students are expected to be able to **use** their knowledge within the contexts in which they are taught.

SAG (Sustainability Action Group)

It has been a while since we have updated what we have been up to so it is high time we let you all know! Last year, the SAG, with the help of Miss Karo and Carmen, undertook a whole school waste audit. The findings are below.



As you can see, food wrappers are a major contributor to the waste found in our bins and on the school grounds. The SAG is working on some ways to help us make healthier choices for ourselves and our environment.

The SAG has come up with a range of strategies to help our school manage waste better. One of the key strategies has been to engage a local organisation called **The Food Embassy.** On Friday last week, they ran their first workshop with the

SAG and it was a great success!

Jess and Liz (dietitians), shared some of their skills and knowledge about healthy eating and sustainable food choices. They will work with us to develop a program that the SAG will facilitate at school. The main aims of the program are:

Caring for ourselves - doing this by thinking about our nutrition.

Caring for others- supporting each other to eat more vegetables, cooking vegetable based snacks that are possibly sold at the canteen.

Caring for our place/environment- supporting local vegetable farmers, community gardens, school garden and so looking at our local context, for example in McLaren Vale we live in a food growing area.

We also held a fundraiser for our new butterfly and bee garden. With your support, we raised over \$120, which will go towards native bee and butterfly attracting plants. Thank you! We want to attract native bees and butterflies as they both assist pollination of our fruits and vegetables grown here at school. Watch this space!

McLAREN VALE YEAR 6 STUDENTS SELECTED FOR THE 2017 **REFUGEE WEEK POSTER AWARDS**

In term 1 of this year, the McLaren Vale year 5, 6 and 7 students, as part of the Art program, took part in the 2017 SA Refugee Week Student Poster competition. Students were inspired by positive stories about refugees settling successfully in Australia. As a result, some wonderful examples of creative and powerful expressions of support for refugees were presented in a poster format. Ten posters were chosen, with difficulty and with hope, to be included in the exhibition. Four students from McLaren Vale; Olivia MacKenzie, Jazmin Bilney, Solomon Candy and Dylan Brandsma-Jones from Room 20 were selected for their outstanding posters. The posters communicated that the world belongs to all and that equality must drive human rights. The selected students showed enthusiasm, energy, compassion and inventiveness in their artworks. The students and their families, along with Miss Karo the Art Teacher, were invited to the poster launch event on Monday the 19th of June. Over a hundred and seventy people attended the award presentations. The artworks were displayed in the School of Art, Architecture and Design at the University of South Australia. Their posters were exhibited amongst 74 that had been selected from over 400, from schools and tertiary institutions across S.A. CAFFREY STREET CARPARK

SLAPPED CHEEK

We have had some cases of 'Slapped Cheek' in the school. Slapped cheek is a viral infection which usually affects children between the ages of 4 and 10, but can happen at any age. First symptoms can include fever, headache, stomach upsets, aches and pains. This is when the virus can be spread. A bright, red rash appears on the cheeks 3 to 7 days after getting the virus, which can also appear on the chest, back, arms & legs. Once the rash appears your child is no longer contagious. If your child is displaying the early signs and symptoms, we ask that you keep your child home until they are no longer contagious.

Mathematics at Primary School

Maths today is about understanding number patterns and there is not a focus on learning by rote or recall, which may be different to the primary school experience you may have had.


Teachers help students to use different strategies such as number lines (see below) that can be used to help figure out problems. There is also a focus on the way in which students work and we acknowledge that there is always more than one way to get the right answer.


Three simple tips:

- ★ Stay positive
- ★ Don't jump in with the answers
- ★ Get your child to explain their thinking to you with questions like "What is the question asking you?"

Number lines are a straight, horizontal line with numbers placed evenly along the length. Number lines are used throughout school and help students initially with number order and sequence. Students then move on to skips counting using number lines which further develops into working out multiplication facts (times tables). Students in the later years of primary school can place and order fractions and decimals on number lines. Regardless of year level it is a good idea to get students in the habit of drawing their own number line in order to help them solve problems.







WORKING BEE



Room 14


