Principal's Report

LYN LANGELUDDECKE

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLANNING

Much of our current work is in developing our school's improvement plan which is informed by international best practice and links expert teaching with quality leadership, student achievement and growth. All schools are following the same 'blueprint' to formulate their plans. The premise is that the more precise we are in our planning and thinking, the greater the impact we will have in actioning our plans and getting the work done.

We now have access to much improved information about each student's achievement and growth and our leaders and teachers have been working tirelessly to analyse data and to identify what our goals for improvement need to focus on. Pursuing less but going deeper, sharpening the impact of thinking is what's important.

We are seeking growth for every student, in every class in 3 areas within literacy and numeracy:

- Reading, through adopting a rigorous and systematic approach to teaching and assessing children's knowledge of oral language and comprehension
- Writing, through explicitly teaching students how to construct compound and complex sentences, extending vocabulary and punctuation for the text genre
- Number, through adopting a rigorous and sequential approach to teaching and assessment in Big Ideas in Number

This clarity around what specifically we want to improve is helping us to identify those high leverage strategies that will bring the change we want to see. Our teachers are the vehicle for actioning these changes and our primary concern is strengthening whole school approaches to literacy and numeracy learning. Next term, our staff will determine a challenge of practice through a collaborative process to improve teaching in the identified areas of curriculum change, as stated above.

We are well on the way to developing an improvement cycle that provides a common process for continuous improvement across the site, informed by evidence of student learning and best practice strategies for achieving growth.

The program is called Play is the Way and provides lots of practical methodology for teaching using guided play, classroom activities and empowering language. Year 3, 5 and 7 students will sit the 2019 NAPLAN tests from May 14 to May 21

NAPLAN is a nationally developed program that provides schools, states and territories with information about education programs that are working and what areas need to be prioritised for improvement.

This year all NAPLAN tests will be administered online across Australia with the exception of the Year 3 Writing test (to be done on paper). The content of these tests are aligned to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

This is a new environment we are working with and if you would like to learn more there is a parent information section online. Here you can also look at examples of tests and how they will work.

NAPLAN individual student reports are expected to be ready for distribution to parents/caregivers soon after the test is complete. Please note, parents/caregivers may withdraw their child from the NAPLAN tests for philosophical or religious reasons. A consent form to withdraw students is available from the front office.




Closing the Gap Ceremony

On Wednesday March 27^{th} , the year 3-7 ATSI students attended the Closing the Gap day at Wayville Showgrounds.


