Our school is at capacity for next year with all classes mostly full (26 in R-2 and 30 in year 3-7).

Staff have spent a lot of time carefully considering the feedback in placing children into classes for 2021.

So many factors are involved in constructing classes: friendships, academic levels, students that can't work together, behavioural issues etc. The benefits are twofold. Taking all of this into account, it gives the students the best chances to excel academically and socially. The other benefit is for the teacher coming in. It's not about constructing a class for a teacher but making sure the class is even, fair and will allow them to teach effectively.

There are always adjustments that children need to make in the transition to a new class. The process starts this week with a meet and greet with their new teacher and class mates. We tend to find that this process helps children to feel more comfortable and takes away any stress or worry over the holidays.

Families will be notified of the placement details (year level, teacher and room) on Thursday, accompanied with the end of year report.

# BIRTH TO YEAR 12 SCHOOL IN ALDINGA

On Friday the CE announced the structure to the new Birth to Year 12 School in Aldinga. It was timely as we now have information to pass on to our community and more importantly, can assess the potential impact on our school. The school will open in 2022 with 2 classes (52), per year level R-2, 1 class of 30 students per year level 3-6, 7 classes of 184 students per year level 7-8. Families opting to send their child/ren to the B-12 will apply through an expression of interest in early 2021. The school has been officially named Aldinga Payinthi College. Payinthi (/'bay-in-di'/) is a Kaurna Aboriginal word that means 'to seek, look for, examine, be thinking'. The name was chosen following an extensive consultation process with representatives from the local community. Aldinga Payinthi College will accommodate up to 1500 students and will open in term 1 2022. No local government schools will close when the new school opens. The new school is intended to cater for the projected enrolment demand coming from strong population growth in the area.

We have powered ahead to ensure our students were supported emotionally and socially through increased care programs in classrooms and a wraparound model through the support of our Wellbeing team. Showing kindness has been the predominant theme this year which is evident every day in the caring relationships our children show for one another. In fact, our children have shown an enormous capacity to be independent, self-managing and resourceful individuals throughout COVID which we are immensely proud of.



A special acknowledgement of the work of our SSO teams and our admin staff that have aligned as a strong and industrious team to improve office operations and services to children, staff and families. They are the heart of our school and we are forever grateful for the high standards that they set. Our curriculum SSOs who are out in the field providing intervention support to our children and working alongside our educators to maximise the learning for every child. Their passion, skill and ability to make a difference is widely recognised by our teaching staff. Our Kitchen and Garden team have had to engineer ingenuity to meet the parameters of the COVID restrictions this year but have provided many rich learning opportunities that have motivated and enthused our keen gardeners and cooks.




