Leadership Report

With term 4 well underway, we are geared up for an exciting last term for 2021. Teachers have been busy planning a term full of opportunities to round off of the year's learning and to ensure the children are well prepared for next year. The term will absolutely fly so do check the calendar (emailed out last week) for class activities. Let's make every day count by living our values of working hard and showing kindness towards one another and enjoy the last 7 weeks together.

Currently teachers are analysing their students' achievements from across the year for the end of year report, which will summarise learning across the 8 curriculum areas. Leaders are also reviewing student data and school operations to determine where we need to improve our practices to enhance student learning. We will be collecting parent feedback through the Governing Council on their views of ways we can strengthen our practices. This provides the foundation for our three year Site Improvement Plan (2022-2024).

This week we were excited to meet our new students who will be joining us as receptions for 2022. The children enjoyed becoming familiar with their school environment, getting to know some of the teachers, making some new friends and learning about what school is like. Next week these children will join us again for their final visit to school. In 2022 when the children begin school a supportive transition process will be in place in their first few weeks to ensure the students and their families have a smooth transition to school. Thank you to our year 6/7 leaders who supported this visit by welcoming our new students and supporting them to enter the reception classrooms, while their parents/caregivers joined Leanne in the library to learn about our wonderful school. The reception teachers reported that all of the children enjoyed their visit and they are looking forward to getting to know them even better next week.



Our year 6 and 7 students have entered their last term of schooling at MVPS. With the dual transition to high school in 2022, our senior teachers have been working closely with the students to address the changes and to focus on the exciting challenges that lay ahead. There are two state wide transition days coming up in week 8 where every student will visit their new school. In celebrating their passage of time at primary school, we will be hosting two graduations: on Monday 6th December for the year 6s and on Tuesday 7th for the year 7s. Both will be held at Lloyds Winery in their function room with the official ceremony starting at 6:00pm, followed by dinner and a disco. We celebrate World Teachers' Day on Friday 29th October. Please acknowledge the dedication and commitment of our wonderful educators, who go well beyond for the children and families of MVPS.

As the close of the school year approaches, we are really looking forward to working together for the children of McLaren Vale this term and ending the year on a high note. It's been a very different year for everyone and whilst we are continuing to maintain normality for our students, we acknowledge the challenges that families are experiencing with the limitation of parents on site. We hope that you are enjoying keeping up to date with classroom learning through Seesaw, we are always open to feedback of any kind.

End of Year Performance

Our end of year performance is again taking on a difference this year. Planning began back at the start of term 3 with discussions taking into consideration the current and potential future COVID restrictions. Our main objective was to devise a way that we could provide for classes to perform and for parents to be involved. Staff were keen to do something different with class items and so we utilised the expertise of our music specialist Beck Frears who has masterminded a musical across the Reception to Year 4 classes, Pirates of the Curry Bean (a take on Pirates of the Caribbean).

Beck has been using her specialist lessons with the R-2/3 classes to teach the songs and dances and her time with the 3/4 classes to practise their script work. The classroom teachers are continuing this rehearsal in their classrooms, to polish the student's performances. The years 5/6-7 classes are working with Nicole on a dance mash-up piece with Rooms 26 & 27 on their own performance piece. We explored local venue options but came back to the school's gym as being the most fitting. Our concert day is Thursday 25th November and we are able to host one parent per family to attend. Our plans are to section off the R-3/4 musical into three parts which will allow parents to attend their child's class performance only. This will allow us to meet the adult capacity requirements of the gym. The year 5-7 class's performance will follow and will also be in two segments. More specific details will be provided but our plans to date are as follows.:

R-4 concert: 5:00- 7:00pm 5-7 concert: 7:00-8:00pm

We will notify parents of the times their child/ren will be performing so that you can arrive at the allocated time, watch your child perform and then move on to allow the next group to come through. We are still working on the finer details as we know that some parents will have more than one child performing. All Reception to Year 2/3 classes should have received a letter detailing the costume their child will need for the musical. The costume letter for the Year 3/4 classes will be out by next week (Week 4). Every family will be provided with a link to the digital download of the performance at a later stage.

Just a reminder that our Caffrey Street carpark is not to be used as a walkway for students and families. Main Road Crossing

You may have noticed that there has been a lot going on in the way of facilities improvements across the school.

Completed works include:

JP verandah installation

Fixed paving for disability access outside gym/canteen area.

DISTRICT ATHLETICS

The district athletics competition was recently held at Tatachilla College with the assistance of the Mid-Coast Little Athletics Club. McLaren Vale Primary School had 43 students, aged 10 -13 years, represent the school in the track and field events.

For the first time in the history of this competition day, the relay event was replaced with a 1500m event. In addition, timing of all running events was introduced, in an effort to establish district track and field records for future competitions. By the end of the day's competition our athletes had accumulated 16 1st place awards, 10 2nd place and 12 3rd places. This led to 13 students being selected into the Onkaparinga South District Athletics Team, for a total of 18 events. They competed at the state competition at SA Athletics Stadium during the final week of term 3. The overall large school winner was Tatachilla, with McLaren Vale placing 2nd.

Parent Update

Week 2, Term 4 - 2021

Preparing for high school

If you are the parent or carer of a year 6 or 7 student, you may be thinking about what your child will need for high school next year.

Our schools make their own decisions about uniforms and learning resources like textbooks and laptops. They will let you know what you need to provide for your child, if they have not done so already.

In this Parent Update, we have outlined some of the Department for Education's overarching policies, guidelines and norms when it comes high school uniforms and technologies.

If you have specific questions about your situation or child, please contact your high school.

School uniform

The Department encourages schools to have a school dress code to help create a sense of community and ensure students are appropriately dressed for school activities.

Uniform policies are developed by individual school Governing Councils for the Principal's approval, in accordance with the Department's school dress code instructions.

Uniform policies should offer a choice of uniform options that are mindful of student diversity and gender expression. Governing Councils also need to consider including financial strategies to keep costs low.

Talk to your school about their uniform requirements and potential cost-saving options like second-hand uniform shops.

Using a mobile phone in high school

Students can bring mobile phones to school to ensure safety when travelling and so parents and students can contact each other. But students must follow their school's rules during the day.

While our primary school students cannot use phones during school hours, high schools have their own individual policies on when students can use them at school, if at all.

Ask your high school for a copy of their local mobile phone policy. You can also find our <u>using mobile phones and personal devices at school</u> page on the Department for Education website.

Laptops and other ICT devices

Many parents buy their child a new device for high school.

High school students use devices like laptops and tablets to create content, research topics and engage in online activities.

Schools make their own decisions about what devices students need and communicate this with parents. Many schools also provide details of lower-cost providers.

Talk to your school about what device your child will need next year. If payment is likely to be an issue, discuss your individual circumstances with the school.
