Bullying No Way

Anti-Bullying is a focus at MVPS and we have a committed Staff and Governing Council Wellbeing team who work hard to raise awareness and develop strategies to reduce the incidence of bullying at our site.

Recently the Governing Council
Wellbeing Committee ran a Parent AntiBullying survey to determine the
perception of our families in relation to
the incidence of bullying at our site, the
types of bullying and feedback on how
effectively we manage our response to
reports of bullying. The Staff as well as
the Governing Council have analysed
this data and we have made some
commitments to action to better

manage and reduce incidences of bullying. We would like to thank the 50 plus families who responded to this survey. You provided honest and valuable feedback and showed us that bullying in our site is consistent with the research and on par with the statistics. (see following infographic). We have some work to do. We have a plan, goals and strategies and we will continue to work hard albeit with a better informed direction.

Classes are revisiting school values and bullying. Students from Year 2-7 are taking part in a bullying audit to tell us the names of the students who bully and what they say and do.

We are also seeking feedback from students on how we can better support our students to manage their response to bullying as well as strategies that we can implement to proactively build a positive school culture in order to reduce the incidence.

We have some positive plans in place to date. These include:

- · Classroom focus on Values and Bullying.
- Whole school audit to identify the students who bully and what they do and say.
- R-7 poster competition. Every entry wins a Bullying No Way or Say No to Bullying. Winning entries at each year level win a movie voucher and have their poster professionally printed.
- Bullying Box introduced as one option in addition to verbal reporting to an adult. This box will be housed in Student Services
- Running Staff and Parent workshops on Bullying more details to come.
- Continuing to build on our values of Respect, Integrity and Success in building a positive school culture and zero tolerance to Bullying.

Thank you to Gizelle Willson (GC) who in 2017 drove the parent Antibullying survey development and the members of our Staff Wellbeing Action Team for their inspiration and commitment in driving this important whole school focus.

Bullying in schools facts and figures

Approximately **one in four** Year 4 to Year 9 Australian students (27%) reported being bullied every few weeks or more often.

Lack of a shared **definition** of bullying can hamper finding lasting solutions.

Students **may not report** bullying to the school because they fear not being believed or making things worse.

Approximately **one in five** young school students reported experiencing online bullying in any one year.

In **87%** of bullying interactions, peers are present as onlookers, and play a central role in the bullying process.

Hurtful teasing was the most common bullying behaviour reported, followed by having hurtful lies told about them.

32% of Year 5s and **29%** of Year 8s reported frequent school bullying.

Students often **tell parents** about bullying rather than anyone else.

Enhancing **social status** with peers is the most commonly reported motivator for bullying.

83% of students who bully others online also bully others in person.

84% of students who were bullied online were also bullied in person.

Students **10 to 15 years of age** are the most likely to be involved in online bullying.

72% of schools reported managing at least one incident of online bullying in the previous year.



The national definition of bullying for Australian schools is the starting point for bullying prevention

Bullying is an ongoing misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/ or social behaviour that causes physical and/or psychological harm. It can involve an individual or a group misusing their power over one or more persons. Bullying can happen in person or online, and it can be obvious (overt) or hidden (covert).

Bullying of any form or for any reason can have long-term effects on those involved, including bystanders.

Single incidents and conflict or fights between equals, whether in person or online, are not defined as bullying. However, these conflicts still need to be addressed and resolved.

Well done to all 9 girls who were part of the SAPSASA Netball team. You should be very proud of your efforts and your positive attitude throughout the game and trainings.







Hiragana Karate Club

Hiragana is one of the three Japanese writing systems and is made up of 46 basic characters; each of which represents a sound in the Japanese language.

Despite the name, the 'Hiragana Karate Club' is not where we practise our martial arts skills (much to the disappointment of some students), but is instead a fun Japanese reading program, designed to encourage students to learn to read the *Hiragana* characters, by earning different coloured belts along the way.

Once students have learned the 46 Hiragana characters, they then move on to learning additional sounds, blends and then putting it all together to read Hiragana words. This is when they earn the ennoble black belt!



We are now very excited to have our first black belt recipients at MVPS! Ashlee, Aleah and Aida have been working very hard to learn their *Hiragana* and have now earned the title of 'Black Belt Champions!' An amazing achievement!
