#### **Term 1 Highlights**

Week 2 census totalled **535 students** with 19 classes. Classes are developing as cohesive communities. We have seen many examples of quality 5 star work along with higher levels of student voice in the learning process.

The influence of 12 new staff partnering with existing staff has brought renewed energy and strength in connections within staff teams. Specialist subjects including PE, Health, Performing Arts, Science and Japanese are broadening learning opportunities along with What's the Buzz and Revved Up with Tyson (PCW) and the ATSI cultural program with Heidi and Bec.

We are continuing our Lead Learn work, having just completed student surveys and moving into staff analysis of this data in supporting more balanced approaches to classroom practices. Staff are continuing to refine spelling programs and implement Big Ideas in Number and fixing common misconceptions. Last Thursday was our first student free day focussing on building children's thinking skills.

We are continuing our work with Madge Sexton Kindergarten through sharing of information, buddy class visits, and joint planning with Reception teachers. Leaders are working together to ensure a K-7 seamless approach to learning.



#### Term 1 Highlights (cont.)

Coordination of intervention support with programs in literacy and numeracy are well underway. NEP and one-plan meetings are currently taking place. Tracking children's learning through data analysis has allowed us to maximise resources and support teachers to ensure every student is showing growth. We are currently identifying our children in the top bands and looking into how we can ensure they are being stretched in their learning.

SAPSASA activities have involved many senior students in swimming, cricket, athletics and cross country with our students winning the shield in Athletics. Special thanks to Tim Walker for his support in training the students.

Years 5-7 students were challenged with activities that took them out of their comfort zone at the **Glenhaven Park Camp** earlier in the year. New relationships were formed and good manners all round

Children entered a large inflatable classroom for an inspiring lesson with FYI Education. FYI uses exciting, interactive technology to engage children to learn about health and wellbeing topics.

Senior students were involved in a successful **Aquatics** program at Port Noarlunga beach in Week 6 and **JP swimming** is about to start next week.

3-way discussions during Weeks 9&10 with children sharing learning tasks and future goals have been well attended (some classes 100%) with positive feedback about the opportunity to engage in this collaborative partnership.

Harmony Day was celebrated with class lessons focussing on 'everyone belonging' and a celebration of the connections between different cultures along with the diversity they bring to Australian life.

The weekly rotation for assemblies is a great way for students to share their work and it's great to see the children's creativity and confidence in their presentations and performances. Parent attendance is high, particularly in the junior primary (doubling of rows at the last) and a highlight was the middle school assembly showcasing 'Bullying, No Way!' All classes reinforced the 'speak, even if your voice shakes' and the grievance procedure should students need help resolving issues.

40 students are involved with the Festival of Music choir convened by Michelle Byrne and Heidi Karo. We have 20 students trained as road traffic monitors. Students have enrolled to become peer mediators which will start next term.

Buddy classes are doing some amazing peer learning. We have elected captains for house teams and we have SRC reps from each class meeting together to discuss ways to make our school great. We also have 10 children in the Sustainable Action Squad working on nude food options.

Volunteer training was held in Week 7 with 15 parents/community partners, broadening our volunteer support base. We are working towards all school volunteers undertaking the DECD requirements of DCSI history screening and the RAN training.

New carpets have been installed in the transportables, junior primary classes and main building. We are updating all lighting with new energy saving fluoroes. The gym air con has gone to tender and currently being negotiated. Work is about to start on the removal of a single transportable (deemed for demolition) and replaced by grassed outdoor learning area (east of Minniss).

It's been a really busy start to the year and it's wonderful to be part of such a dynamic and forward thinking community. We greatly appreciate the dedicated work of our staff, teaching and SSO support and ongoing positive feedback from our families about the school and its programs.



Hi everyone. I hope you all had a wonderful Easter with your families, had some time to relax and didn't consume too much chocolate!




Those students who won their event have been selected to represent the Onka South District at the State Athletics Competition later this year, where they will compete against the best athletes from all metropolitan schools.
